The rosary group began in 1988, the 'Marian' year. At first we took a statue of Our Blessed Lady to each house that was hosting each week. Later we all had our own statues and put a candle and flower on a table or mantlepiece alongside Our Blessed Lady and said the Rosary. We always met on a Friday evening but that changed in the last few years as most of us preferred the afternoon at 3pm. At our most attended weeks, we had up to 23 people to pray the sorrowful mysteries, always for various intentions. We are unfortunately down to approximately 3-5 people now. We used to collect £1 each week from each person and in so doing, supported an Indian seminarian right through to his ordination. Since the loss of Gerry King, who saw to all the finance and correspondence with Father George in India,

we have put our money into the orange buckets after Mass. We don't want this worthwhile group to end so we are asking for more people to support the Friday meetings and to continue what so many started, many of which are sadly no longer with us.
